

This is a space where leaders engage in deep conversations, debates, and showcases on core areas for accelerating SDG action vis-a-vis the themes of People, Planet and Partnerships.

Statement by our Executive Director

n this occasion of the 75th Anniversary of the United Nations, we must not forget the good works of past generations, whose commitment to peace and a "rules based" co-existence of nations has lifted millions out of poverty and misery.

COVID-19, like other global crises, is bigger than any one nation and reinforces the unique role of the United Nations to bring the world together as one. The United Nations has made significant progress over the decades in improving peace and security, poverty reduction, clean water, improved sanitation, gender equality, and other critical areas of development.

In 2000, the world was introduced to the ground-breaking concept of the Millennium Development Goals. Fifteen years later, we adopted the ambitious Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), with clear targets to be achieved by 2030. The New Urban Agenda will help nations harness urbanization as a catalytic force to deliver the SDGs.

In the past 75 years, the world has come a long way in our commitment to ensure adequate shelter for all. The built environment and the rapid rate of urbanization is now changing the very nature of the planet. By 2050, 70 per cent of humanity will live in urban areas; in 2020, 95 per cent of all COVID-19 cases are found in our towns and cities. Our fate is inextricably bound up with the places we call home — be it a slum, the virtual village, or the city.

No journey is smooth. At this point in our history, the SDGs may seem far and away. Yet, I believe we can achieve these goals by empowering individuals, communities, neighbourhoods, and cities to take small steps together.

We need to be inspired by the moral character of past generations, we need to harness the drive of our youth, capture the wisdom of our elders, and encourage innovation and creativity at all levels.

Above all, we need action on the ground, advocacy in the virtual world and commitment to do whatever it takes to leave future generations a better world, where no one and no place is left behind.



We all face ethical challenges in our day-to-day work. As we mark the 75th anniversary of the UN, the United Nations Leadership Dialogue is an opportunity for all personnel to discuss topics that bear great meaning for our work.

Under the theme of Acknowledging Dignity through Civility: How can I communicate for a more harmonious workplace?, this year's Dialogue will focus on creating a respectful environment for providing constructive feedback and for challenging ideas. The Dialogue is an opportunity to shift mindsets and to explore a new possible dynamic of workplace interactions.

The session is mandatory for all personnel and runs for about 1.5 hours. The deadline for completion of this year's session is 30 November 2020.






Report of the UN75 Office

To coincide with the General Assembly's official commemoration of the UN anniversary, answers to the global consultation to mark the 75th anniversary of the UN were released in September. The results are available in this report.

The global consultation was launched in January 2020 and invited, through surveys and dialogues, people from all walks of life to share their hopes and fears for the future as well as their priorities for international cooperation, and for the United Nations in particular.





Over one million answers were collected across all UN Member States and Observer States. The top priority of most respondents everywhere is improved access to basic services. How does shelter rank? Find out in the report.
